

Vitamin D deficiency is an emerging public health issue and can lead to bone pain and muscle weakness. It also increases the risk of osteoporosis, falls and fractures. Osteoporosis is a condition where the bones become fragile and brittle, and break more easily than normal bone.

Vitamin D is essential for the development and maintenance of bone, and assists calcium absorption from food in the intestine.

The main source of vitamin D is from exposure of the skin to sunlight. Food sources are limited, but include oily fish, liver, eggs and some foods that have been fortified with vitamin D. It is difficult to obtain enough vitamin D from diet alone.

Fair skinned people need to expose their face, hands and arms to the sun for 10 minutes in the summer (before 10am or after 2pm) and 30 minutes in the winter (at noon). People with dark skin need 3 or 4 times more exposure. Sunscreens will block the vitamin D production in the skin. This is obviously going to be a dilemma for some people who are at high risk of skin cancer or are highly sun sensitive. These people may need to take a vitamin D supplement.

People most at risk of vitamin D deficiency are

- The elderly. (As the body ages, it becomes less good at making vitamin D and new bone).
- Those in residential care or who are housebound. (Many of these people do not spend enough time outside in the sun).
- Naturally dark-skinned people. (the pigment in their skin shields the skin from UV rays)
- Those who cover their skin for cultural or religious reasons, or to protect against skin cancer.
- Babies of vitamin D deficient mothers.

A multi-vitamin supplement would suit someone who had a diet rich in calcium (lots of milk, yoghurt or cheese), but rarely went outside, or needed to avoid the sun.

Fish oil capsules are a good source of vitamin D. A calcium/vitamin D supplement ('Caltrate Plus'), would be suitable for an older person who did not have a diet high in calcium and was rarely exposed to the sun.

Women over 50, and men over 70 are at risk of osteoporosis and need 3 serves of dairy products each day, to get enough calcium to prevent osteoporosis. (1 serve is equal to 250ml milk, or 1 tub of yoghurt or 1 slice of cheese).

A high salt intake causes the kidneys to excrete calcium from the body, so a low salt diet will retain more calcium in the body. A low salt diet is difficult to achieve because 2/3 of salt intake comes from manufactured foods like bread, cereals, spreads and flavourings. Salt-reduced manufactured products need to be used to successfully reduce your salt intake. (A low-salt diet will also lower your blood pressure.)

Skills Centre

Over the last several years Lilydale District School has been negotiating with a range of stakeholders on exploring possibilities for the old Library/Courthouse building. This process slowed a little due to transitions of Principals at the school and also due to changing funding opportunities.

The school has submitted a funding application to the federal Department of Science, Education and Training for sufficient funds for this wonderful community facility to be upgraded. Through ongoing negotiations with several community groups, the submission, if successful, would see the Magistrate's room left untouched (in deference to its heritage value) while the Library would house the online access centre. The foyer and kitchen would be improved and an additional room (roughly similar in size to the library room) would be added across the back of the building. The

attached plan is a concept drawing only for funding purposes – not to be considered as *the* plan.


Our purpose for doing this is to secure Commonwealth funding to preserve and develop this community asset and make it more accessible to community use. The school would offer adult learning courses and would work with other groups who may wish to utilise the facility.

We don't expect to know the outcome of our submission for several months yet. We propose that, if successful, the refurbished building would be administered by a board of management comprised of representatives from appropriate stakeholders. Recipe of the Month

Spinach Pie

Ingredients:
4 sheets filo pastry
Olive oil spray
250g spinach, cooked and well
drained
250g low-fat fresh ricotta

2 eggs

Pinch of ground nutmeg

4 green shallots, ends trimmed, thinly sliced

3 large handfuls of fresh mint, chopped

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C. Place the filo sheets on a clean work surface. Cover with a dry tea towel, then a damp tea towel (this will prevent the filo from drying out).
- 2. Spray a round 20cm (base measurement) quiche dish with olive oil spray to lightly grease.
- 3. Place 1 filo sheet in the prepared dish. Spray lightly with olive oil spray. Continue layering with the remaining filo, turning each filo sheet and spraying lightly with olive oil spray between layers.
- 4. Combine the spinach, ricotta, eggs, nutmeg, shallot and mint in a bowl.
- 5. Spoon the mixture over the filo in the dish.
- 6. Fold over the edges to enclose the filling. Lightly spray with olive oil spray.
- 7. Bake in oven for 30 minutes or until golden. Cut into wedges to serve
