Dear Sir,

Paul's gone, but Bryan is back. What more compelling argument could one have that the size of the Tasmanian Parliament should be increased? Fancy giving a position to a fellow who doesn't even know that an agreement is binding. How could you trust him?

Anyway, let's look at a different type of bird life, the one that gives more pleasure, at least while they last. If clearfell logging continues at its present pace, we'll only have pictures in books to remind us what they looked like. Here are some affected species, as listed by Birds Australia.

The endemic species Dusky Robin is decreasing. Clearfelling on the east coast has reduced local populations of the Strong-Billed Honeyeater. Likewise the Black-Headed Honeyeater. Logging with fuel reduction and slash-burn eliminates Satin Flycatchers from an affected area. Clearfelling has a negative impact on the abundance of the Southern Boobook due to the removal of cavities in mature eucalypts which are important to breeding. The frequency of sighting of the Flame Robin has decreased substantially [50% in the past 20 years]. Logging causes significant local adverse impacts on the Pink Robin. Logging causes loss of nesting habitat of the Common Bronzewing.

There are far more bird species affected adversely according to the 2006 report by Birds Australia to the Resource Planning and Development Commission. We should all care about this impending tragedy to our bird life before it is too late.

Furthermore, in an article in the May 30th. Examiner, spokesman for the LPG Mike Scott was quoted as saying "the Lilydale community has been quite apathetic about the

way the village would be developed in the future and the plantation issue has changed that."

I've got news for Mr. Scott. Lilydale and its many facilities he and his core supporters no doubt enjoy today, were and still are being provided by dedicated people, with a great sense of community spirit and without seeking any personal gain or self patronising publicity.

"Communities like this do not simply happen. They are a result of the efforts of many community minded people, who were prepared to roll up their sleeves and get on with the job. Can we in the future, look forward to the same commitment by members of the LPG, or does the association's aims & objects limit its involvement to specific causes ?

The smile on everyone's faces not just the children's in the Lantern Light makes this Community Event a Special One.





**Pharmacy News:
Health Notes: DRY EYES.**

We all recognise the problems associated with dry skin, but we probably don't realise that "dry eye" is also a very common condition and a trigger for many eye complaints such as eye infections and allergy reactions.

Dry eye is sometimes just a natural part of growing older – skin and eyes dry up as we mature. It is most common in people over the age of 50, particularly in women after menopause. However, our lifestyle, occupation and surroundings can also cause dry eye. Hot, dry, windy weather makes the eyes dry – as does air conditioning and heating in offices and homes. Long hours staring at TV, computer screens and books; and air pollutants such as cigarette smoke are other contributing factors.

Dry eye symptoms can include burning, itching, stinging, soreness, grittiness, sensitivity to light and the feeling that "there is something in the eye".

Blinking more frequently will encourage the eyes to make more tears, and lubricate them. This is particularly beneficial if you spend long hours looking at screens or books. Tears, which are part of the eye's natural defence mechanism, are not just water - they are made up of several components, which nourish and protect the eyes. The eyes can become "watery" in association with a dry eye condition, but this fluid may not provide sufficient lubrication or nourishment to the surface of the eye.

Some medicines can reduce the tear production and make a dry eye worse. These can include fluid tablets, some anti-depressants, some anti-histamines and some which are used to treat high blood pressure.

If you are a dry eye sufferer, then you should consider the regular use of eye drops. Tear replacement products such as Refresh, Poly-Tears or Systane can be used as often as necessary. For occasional use, when the eyes are red, moisturising drops with a decongestant (eg. Clear eyes) may be used. If you use contact lenses, only some drops are suitable (e.g. Poly-Tears and GenTeal). Eye gels are preferable for overnight use as their effect is more long lasting than the drops.

Eye drops should be discarded one month after opening to prevent contamination; but if you need drops only now and again, products such as Refresh, come as a box of single-use vials. One vial is used when required and the remainder stored for later use. These drops contain no preservative, so they are also suitable for contact lens wearers.

***Did you know that during the war years of 1939-1945 members raised funds for the Red Cross, prisoners of war and the British Air Raid Relief, provided food parcels, made 27,000 camouflage nets for the armed forces, repaired army uniforms and were involved in the Womens Land Army. A Voluntary Aid Detachment held classes in first aid and home nursing around Tasmania. An ambulance was donated to the armed forces in the Pacific.

The Association has been involved with many issues affecting rural communities, including the provision of better education, health and telephone services. Among numerous matters addressed have been the placement of seat belts in cars; bubble packaging of medicines and recommending the installation of audible signals at traffic lights for the visually impaired.***



Lilydale Protection Group

Members of the LPG met at the Mt Arthur Centre, 17/6/08, where it was established that LPG should remain as a community group and carry forward with issues that have come out of the campaign. It was recognised that we need to further expand on the goals and objectives of the group.

Holding regular meetings was an agreed way to proceed and it is suggested that the group meet at 7.30pm on the second Tuesday of every month, at the Mt Arthur Centre. As a follow up to these meetings, a monthly report will be placed in the Progressive. We now have 88 members. Membership forms are available and payment can be made at the Lilydale Post Office.

Thanks was extended to all those involved in the campaign of the last few months. Many people donated their time, materials, food for the rally, use of vehicles, phones, banners, money and so on in such a fantastic community spirit. The Lilydale campaign became a huge news item all over Tasmania (and further afield) for a few weeks, and will certainly be used as a test case for future community actions.

We had very positive feedback from the council about our actions and further commitment to the future of our community. The Whiting's farm sale is now proceeding well towards completion.

Planning Scheme

A preliminary meeting is scheduled on the 1st July at the Senior Citizens Club to hear from us what we want for our future and to disseminate information regarding the economic and legal restraints upon the LCC, when amending the planning scheme, in order for us as a community to understand what we might reasonably hope for. This has come about as a direct result of the recent efforts of the LPG and we are desirous of sharing this opportunity with the whole community.

The meeting will be chaired by the Mayor and is being organised by the Progress Association. A town planner will display the map of Lilydale and plans to date with explanations about decisions and delineations being provided. The constraints involved in planning, such as economic, legal and others will also be discussed.

Creating a Vision for our Community

Two workshops are being offered to all members of the Lilydale community on the 13th July and 17th August, to be facilitated by Tony Richardson. (Tony is an experienced facilitator who has previously performed a similar role for the LCC). It is hoped that all issues and thoughts about the division in the community will be drawn out, whether they are constructive thoughts, feelings of anger, resentment, or whatever. This activity has the potential to heal rifts in the community and provides a real hope for a shared future and will draw out ideas to inform the Launceston City Council's Planning Scheme.

The Appeal by FEA

A significant number of people have made submissions, supporting the council's vote in favour of the local community, against the FEA subdivision application. If many letters are received, it is likely that they will ask for one legal representative to act on behalf of the group.

Lilydale Progress Association

Tom, Dee and Margy represented the LPG at the last meeting, 3/6/08, presenting information about our campaign, in an attempt to bridge the gap between the divided interests in our community. Wider support for this community group, Lilydale Progress Association, is encouraged and it was suggested that people could join in order to have an input into future decisions about Lilydale. It was considered essential to maintain communications between the two groups.

Community Search

Community Search is an activity that is educative and exploratory, which will occur in a respectful and non-threatening manner. It can be effective in revitalising the community by assisting us to rediscover our common ground, establish common goals and realise the potency in moving forward as a united community. Two such events are scheduled for Lilydale. The second will build on the first. Although participation in both is encouraged, if you can attend only one session that is fine.

Who should attend? Everyone who has an interest in

creating a positive future for our local community. All views, all perspectives will be welcomed and valued.

It will be facilitated by Anna Pafitis and Tony Richardson who between them have been doing this sort of work in lots of different places and settings.

When? Phase 1: July 13th 2008, Phase 2: August 17th (to be confirmed in August Progressive)

Where? Mt Arthur Centre (to be confirmed)

Why? To discover the potential of our community and how we may move forward together. It is hoped this forum will inform and enhance Lilydale's participation in the review to the Launceston Planning Scheme.


