Editorial

Travel, as they say, broadens the mind. It also exhausts the body, reduces the bank balance and increases the waistline ;-). I'm sitting in a charming B&B looking out on a quiet and peaceful rural setting, able (for the first time in nearly 3 weeks) to sit and think about all the places we've been and the sights we've seen.

Since leaving Oz in early May we've braved the hustle and bustle of Bangkok, travelling the city by skyrail, boat and foot.

Bangkok has changed dramatically in the past 16 years, but the people are the same friendly, helpful ones I remember from my last visit.

We made an emotional trip to the site of the War Graves in Kanchanaburi, and walked across the bridge over the river Kwai. Our visit to the Hellfire Pass Museum explained exactly why this infamous place was so named.

I touched a tiger at a Temple and ate a magnificent banquet on a rice barge on the Chao Phraya river, visited the Grand Palace and of course shopped 'til I dropped.

On to Scotland to pick up a narrow boat at Falkirk. There were 6 of us (none of who had ever had much experience with boats) Bryan found he was a natural at manoeuvring the 62 foot long, 7 foot wide craft along the canal, through locks, onto and up the Falkirk Wheel, (an amazing piece of engineering that is capable of lifting 4 narrow boats at a time to a height of 115 feet and only using enough power to boil 4 kettles) under a heap of bridges and into the heart of Edinburgh.

On our return trip we walked in the footsteps of Mary, Queen of Scots, at

her birthplace in Linlithgow.

Following this relaxing week we had 2 frantic days in Paris. I've eaten dinner on the tower Gustav Eiffel built, cruised the Seine, seen half naked girls at the Moulin Rouge, priceless



works of art including (along with a couple of thousand others) the Mona Lisa at the Louvre, walked the gardens and halls of the Chateau de Versaille, wandered the paths in the gardens at the Petit Trianon where Marie Antoinette escaped from the formality of the French Court, and, of course, eaten far too many fantastic french pastries.

We've got 2 more weeks to go and many, many more places to see. The trip so far has been amazing, the people we've met have all been helpful and friendly (yes even the ones in France despite what many had told me to expect), who knows exactly what we'll experience next, that's the great part about traveling, you never know what's around the next corner....



Pharmacy News:

Health Notes: Depression.

We often use this word to describe feelings of sadness and grief that we experience in everyday life. Most people will feel unhappy or sad when faced with the stress of a relationship breakdown, a death, or great disappointment or frustration. These emotional reactions are appropriate to the situation and will not last a long time. They are normal.

Some people experience feelings of depression for longer than normal, and often also have anxiety, poor sleep, tiredness, lethargy, loss of appetite, feelings of inadequacy, loss of motivation, feeling hopeless. Depression is more than just a low mood - it's a serious illness. While we all feel sad, moody or low from time to time, some people experience these feelings intensely, for long periods of time and often without reason. In these situations, a visit to the doctor may reveal a need for treatment - which may be 'talking therapy' or medication.

Medication is needed when the doctor considers that a chemical imbalance in the brain is causing the depression. A chemical imbalance in the brain needs to be treated for many months or years, otherwise the depression returns. People with depression find it hard to function every day and may be reluctant to participate in activities they once enjoyed.

Depression is associated with stress, such as following a personal tragedy or disaster. It is more common at certain stages in life, such as retirement in men; and childbirth or menopause in women. It often runs in families.

People with certain personality characteristics are more prone to depression. Perfectionists, who set very high standards for themselves or others, and those who find it difficult to adjust to changing circumstances, are easily depressed. Also those who are very dependent on others.

Depression is one of the most common of all mental health problems. One in five people experience depression at some stage of their lives. Depression affects all ages and is one of the most common illnesses in young adults.

There are other mental illnesses which affect young adults, such as bipolar disorder (or manic depression), schizophrenia, anxiety and eating disorders. These may have some symptoms similar to depression. A person with depression will often not recognize it. It may take a family member or close friend to recognize that there is a problem.

Lilydale Neighbourhood Watch Report:

A good attendance at this meeting and we also had 2 guests from the Don River Railway. They were Bill Housego and Harry Camplin. Bill spoke about the Don River Railway and how it is still going well locally. The income dropped dramatically when the mainline railway stopped. Several trips which were successful when all the rail lines were opened are now closed or are poorly supported. He said that local communities are missing out on income from the passengers who travelled on the trains. The Don River Railway is completely run by volunteers and there are no paid people in the office of D.R.R. They are open every day except Christmas Day and Good Friday. Bill would also like to see the N. E. line open again from Launceston to Scottsdale. Since the main lines have closed the rail lines have deteriorated in some areas and some bridges need repairs doing before they can open. These costs are quite expensive. The Derwent Valley line will take a lot of money to get it up and going again. There may be new operators of the Railway lines in the near future but we will have to wait and see.

POLICE REPORT

1. Overnight on the 18th April unknown offenders gained access to 3 heavy vehicles at the bridgeworks on Golconda Road by smashing windows on the vehicles. Three 2 way radios valued at \$1310 were stolen and \$800 damage was done to the vehicles.

2. Between 1pm and 2pm on 26th April, some unknown offenders removed 2 Japanese Maple trees valued at \$520 from the yard of a home on Lilydale Road 15 Agapanthus plants and 20 Canna Lily plants were also stolen. An older model white 4WD station wagon was seen near the house with the maple trees protruding from the rear of the vehicle.

3. Between 7.30pm on 30th April and early morning on the 1st May a rock was used to smash 2 windows at a business on Main Road, Lilydale. The offenders then proceeded to steal 2 boxes of Cadburys chocolate, a scarf and a pair of gloves. Estimated damage of \$1300 was caused to the windows.

Suspicious Incidents.

1. On 28th April a local person was abused by 5 young people riding their bikes on the footpath outside the Post Office. Police have been notified.

2. About 24th April some windows in the Lebrina Hall were shattered possibly by bullets. Police have been notified.

3. A maroon coloured duel cab was seen overtaking 2 school buses where there were double white lines. This is illegal and very dangerous.

Lilydale Lantern Walk Friday June 20th 6.00pm.


"Roll up, Roll up!

Private boxes are now available at the Lilydale Post Office. If you require 24 hour access to your mail or require your mail early, this is the way to go. It is particularly handy if you work, cannot access the post office between the hours of 9.00am-5.00pm or live a little way out of town. If you are not serviced by a mail delivery, then Australia Post heavily subsidize the box for you, so it is quite inexpensive for a yearly rental.

There are a few small boxes and one medium box available at the moment though they usually do not stay vacant for long. So if you are thinking of acquiring a private post box, now is the time to contact your friendly staff at the Lilydale Post Office who will gladly assist you with the applicable cost and application form.

Lilydale District School:

The new irrigation system

We have put in hoses and sprinklers so we can water the vegetable garden at the School's Agricultural Studies area. One of the VET students from the farm helped us put in the irrigation system and it is working really well. We used funds given to us by Temco and Landcare to buy the piping, sprinklers and a huge variety of joiners. Temco also granted money to install a rainwater tank.



The new improved compost area

Landcare granted the school some money to set up a new compost area in the Agricultural Studies area at the school. We pulled the old tin and shade cloth and used treated pine sleepers to build a new compost bin set up. Students did all the work and it looks great. Each classroom now has a food scrap bin, which children empty every day into the compost heap or the worm farm, some scraps like apples and plain bread are fed to the hens. It has two more sections to be erected and it is complete.

Mary Walsh Centre Winning Recipe:

Veggie Burgers- makes approximately 12

1x450gm tin of chickpeas, mashed (substitute kidney beans, bean mix etc. or soak and cook your own beans, as we usually do) 1 medium sized onion, finely chopped 1 carrot, grated ½ eggplant (or equal quantity of zucchini), minced or grated 2 cloves garlic, crushed ¼ cup chopped fresh herbs, parsley, coriander, chives etc. 2-3 sticks celery, finely chopped (include some of the most tender leaves) 1 tablespoon chutney, pickle or tomato paste.

1 cup of fresh bread crumbs (use only wholegrain bread- we use our own sour dough bread)

½ cup sunflower/ pumpkin seeds 1 farm egg, beaten. Pinch of cayenne pepper

A dash of tamari/ soy sauce/ chilli sauce

Method

Form into patties.

Roll in wholemeal flour.

Cook in a lightly oiled pan until golden.

By now everyone has replaced their smoke detector batteries , "right" we recommend you change these when you turn your clocks back at the end of day light savings. Please test them regularly, Smoke Detectors Save Lives. We can also assist with installation.

Finally, if you would like to become a Fire Fighter we have vacancies for new members.



Lilydale Protection Group

The community meeting held on 22nd April was in response to notification of neighbours bordering the Whiting's property that a subdivision proposal had been put to council. It became clear that a significant number of community members were alarmed to hear that a plantation was to be the outcome of the subdivision and sale of the property. The meeting extended an open invitation to community members, the aldermen of the LCC and representation from FEA. FEA failed to attend.

Activities since this date have been summarised below for easier reading:

The Main Aims Adopted After the Meeting of 22nd April were;

To dissuade FEA from establishing a commercial plantation on the Whiting property.

To ensure that all parties (in particular the community and the owner) achieve a satisfactory and honourable outcome.

To inform the community about the consequences of loss of farming land to plantations and about alternative futures.

To identify community priorities for the way in which the district should develop environmentally, socially and economically.

To engage with the LCC and seek their assistance in realising the above.

Activities Based on the Above;

Community meetings held to test the opinion of the community and establish a mandate for action. As a result the LPG was formed.

Encouragement for community members to engage with their representatives in the LCC (and elsewhere) through submissions. One hundred and thirty responses were made.

Website and communication links to keep all interested members of the community informed and able to contribute.

Banners / sign campaign to help those in the community who felt strongly about the issue to 'voice' their concern and show the breadth of support for the aims of LPG.

Media campaigns to ensure that the broader community and our representatives understood the wishes of the LPG and our commitment.

Developing strategies for negotiation / mediation that would respect the needs of the Whiting's. Understanding the complexity of the situation, the predicament of the Whiting's situation and the lack of democratic avenues for the community to protest against plantation establishment led a concerned local resident to offer to buy the Whiting farm at the FEA price as an alternative 'way out'.

Attending the 'mediation' session held by the LCC Planning Dept. Although FEA did not attend, despite a further invitation from council, the 80 members of the community were given an opportunity to discuss the current planning review.

The Rally: both an information session for all and an opportunity for the community to show their commitment to keeping plantations out of the district.

Attending the Council meeting. Showing the deep interest in the matter to our Aldermen and our support for their making a decision based on community needs rather than planning regulations.

From This Point On the LPG Priorities are:

To bring the issue of the Whiting farm to a peaceful conclusion. It is expected that the sale to a local who wishes to maintain the farm as a grazing property will be completed shortly.

To build bridges within the community. Due to the short time frame required, to mobilise community opinion and mount an effective campaign against a threat to the community, the work of the LPG and supporters has necessarily been bold and at times confronting. This has unfortunately been uncomfortable for many residents. Now that the immediate threat is over there will be earnest moves to contact and communicate the community vision behind the LPG much more broadly and to listen to all feedback.

To work with the planning department of the LCC and the broader community to influence the outcomes of the current planning review in a manner that is appropriate for the continued development of a healthy and vibrant Lilydale.


Additional Comments

At no stage did the LPG purposefully aim to cause distress to any member of the community. If people have taken offence to anything that has arisen from the work of the LPG then that is a cause for regret and the LPG sincerely apologises. Where complaints over the language content of signs has been received it has been rectified.

Despite the tone of some misinformed reports, the LPG have at no time acted outside the law or in a way that could be described as victimisation. This, despite the fact that many members of the group have been the victims of trespass, property damage, verbal and even physical assault.

When the issue of the Whiting farm is concluded and the community has had time for reflection, LPG will look forward to working with all residents to ensure that a level of communication and understanding is reached which will ensure that the divisions of the past few weeks are never repeated.
