## Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

For most days during the last two weeks, Lilydale residents have been breathing and seeing smoke generated by forestry burn offs in areas adjacent to the Lilydale valley and further afield. During this time the community has been informed of the intention of Forest Enterprises Australia Limited to establish a large tree plantation on the southern edge of the village right underneath Brown Mountain, which overlooks the village.

Of course, the establishment of such a plantation would mean that burn offs would become a reality on a significant scale right here in Lilydale. So just add 60-plus hectares of forestry burn off along Lilydale Road to the burn offs going on outside the immediate vicinity of the valley, as helicopters firebomb logged areas, with the obvious evidence being the mushroom clouds that have been quite visible on approach to the village. Add to this, probable aerial spraying of pesticides and herbicides with the inevitable drift of lethal chemicals across neighbouring properties (including two organic farms) and also the village, the contamination of Rocky Creek (several streams flow through the property into this creek which runs through the village), and the diminishment of the value of neighbouring properties, then we have a real threat to the health and wellbeing, and in some cases, livelihood of Lilydale residents.

If you also have concerns about the impact of this proposal we would suggest that you express them to the Launceston Council which is currently taking representations in relation to this proposal. But do it soon, as it would appear the company is keen to lock in its plans, perhaps before more of the community gets wind of what is afoot; do you get the drift?

It is beyond doubt that it will have a negative impact on the people who visit us, our village, our state and our country.

Nobody denies that we use and need the product of plantation, never the less the shockwaves which will reverberate through our community if it neglects to say NO! to F.E.A.'s plantations around the village will surely be the cause of people turning away from this unique place and the livelihoods that rely and depend on its being so.

Regretfully I have been told that there are no legal avenues open to the likes of me to prevent F.E.A. from going ahead with their project. They say that it is after 'English Law' and as owners they can do what they like. Believe that if you like, but thanks to God for a community who has rallied behind a good cause and demonstrated that not forgotten spirit of the Anzac's.

The Lilydale Protection Group Inc. Please support this new group in any way you can and help shape the future of your community.



Diabetes and Pre-diabetes

**Type 2 diabetes** (or late onset diabetes) has more than doubled over the last 20 years and is now Australia's 6<sup>th</sup> biggest killer. It can lead to heart attacks, strokes, kidney failure, amputations and blindness. Diabetes Australia expects 1.8 million Australians to have diabetes by 2010. Type 2 diabetes occurs when you become 'insulin resistant', which then results in too much glucose in your blood. The role of insulin is to push the glucose out of the blood and into the cells – where it is used for energy. A high level of glucose in the blood will damage (and eventually destroy) the tiny blood vessels everywhere in the body.

Type 2 diabetes is determined by measuring blood glucose levels. Fasting blood glucose of more than 7 mmol/l will diagnose type 2 diabetes.

**Pre-diabetes** is the stage before type 2 diabetes. Fasting blood glucose of between 6 and 7 mmol/l is an indication that type 2 diabetes may develop within 5 to 10 years (unless you take action). Pre-diabetes also increases your risk of heart attack and stroke. There is good evidence that aspirin reduces the risk of heart attack and stroke if you have pre-diabetes. (ask your doctor) Lifestyle intervention is the best way to reduce blood glucose levels.

A program of no smoking, modest weight loss, good dietary habits and regular physical activity will result in lower risk of diabetes. Physical activity needs to have a little bit of 'puff' involved. This means a brisk walk rather than a leisurely stroll. Exercise not only controls weight, it also increases your insulin sensitivity, which then lowers blood glucose levels. Eating smaller meals and choosing foods that don't raise blood sugar levels so much will help. A waist measurement of less than 80cm for women, and less than 94 cm for men is desirable. A woman's waist should be smaller than her hips. A man's waist can be the same but not greater than his hips.

At the pharmacy we have a diet guide which you can use to manage diabetes diets, low fat diets, high calcium diets and much more. Did you know that a 375 ml can of soft drink contains the equivalent of 10 teaspoons of sugar?

We also have pedometers to motivate you to increase your activity. These clip on to your belt or waistband. Most people walk between 3,000 and 4,000 steps a days. Aim for 8,000 to 10,000 steps each day.

If lifestyle interventions don't work, then regular medication will be required to keep blood glucose levels at safe levels.

## Planning A Vegetable Garden

It's time to start planning your vegetable garden and here's a tip to help make it easy for you.

Use "Post-its" - those small note pads that are sticky. They make it easy and fast.

Here's How:

1. Work on a hard surface - a board or tabletop
2. Decide the scale of your garden - example: 1 inch (2.5 cm) equals 1 foot (.3 m)
3. Each Post-it equals a plot in your garden
4. Write each crop name on a Post-it
5. Simply lift and restick each crop as many times as you want until you're happy with the arrangement

This works very well with succession planting as well because you can simply layer Post-its on top of each other.

For example if you plan to follow an early crop of lettuce with a crop of beans, you can use two Post-its on that plot to show the succession.

Post-its also work really well when figuring out how you want to rotate your crops to keep the soil and plants as healthy as possible.



## The Lilydale Protection Group Inc.

Re: Application to develop or use land in the vicinity of  
Lilydale, DA0144/2008.

Details of this application were received by a number of  
persons having property in the vicinity of the lots  
covered by this application. Because it was admitted by  
FEA (Forest Enterprises Australia Ltd), the organisation  
behind this application, that its purpose was to create a  
monoculture Eucalyptus nitens plantation on the land, a  
meeting was called at very short notice for all concerned  
to consider all the implications of this proposal. Nearly  
100 people attended the meeting held in the Lilydale  
Village Hall on Tuesday 8 April. The Launceston City  
Council (LCC) was well represented with the Mayor, the  
Deputy Mayor, Alderman Ted Sands, Jeremy Ball & Ian  
Norton, the Director of Development Services, Ian  
Abernethy and General manager, Frank Dixon.

After describing the whereabouts of the plots, attention  
was directed to the implications of establishing a  
plantation on this area adjacent to the village.

**Visually.** Lilydale is a gem of rural beauty being a  
mixture of forest clad mountain and hills and rolling  
alpine meadows. A plantation will significantly detract  
from this scenic beauty. The position of this proposal,  
under Brown Mountain, makes it clearly visible from the  
Launceston road. Approximately half of the area is  
scheduled as Scenic Protection Area!

**Contamination.** The land is uphill of the village and  
very steep. Soil and Chemicals applied will wash down  
into Rocky Creek which then runs through the village  
close to properties and to the Village Green. 1080, if  
applied, will lead to poisoned animals straying beyond the  
property and becoming a serious risk to local pet  
dogs. Chemicals applied by helicopter are likely to drift,  
and the village school is only one kilometre from the  
boundary. Local Organic Farms would be in danger of  
losing their organic certification.

**Loss of Property value.** Properties adjacent to planta-  
tions become difficult to sell, so their value falls. This  
could lead to an escalation of other nearby properties  
selling to plantation companies. The population of  
Lilydale would contract leading to loss of jobs in the area  
and of customers for the many excellent shops and  
services in the village. Lilydale could become a ghost  
village, as has happened elsewhere for the same reason.

**Conflict with the area's existing historical and  
cultural heritage.** The valley's founding families have  
left the community with a range of publicly accessible  
spaces that protect the horticultural and ecological  
history of the district, including the Lilydale Falls, the  
Walker Rhododendron Gardens, and Brown Mountain.  
These spaces enhance the rural/residential quality of the  
town, and an industrial tree farm in their midst was seen

by those present as seriously at odds with this vision.

The main problem giving rise to this unfortunate situation is the planning legislation of State and Council which does not permit rural landowners to build dwellings on titles of less than 40Ha. A change in zoning would considerably increase the value of local properties, and revenue to the council, and preserve Lilydale as a semi-residential area with all its excellent amenities and would enable the establishment of speciality and hobby farms which are a particular feature of the Lilydale district. Many comments showed deep concern for the current owner of the property who has apparently been trying to sell for some time. His right to dispose of his property in any way he sees fit was clearly respected. However, from a broader perspective this has to be tempered by consideration for the future livelihoods of neighbouring producers and the potential costs to the wider community. At the root of the problem lie the State planning restrictions that have made it difficult to dispose of 'rural' zoned properties.


The meeting was first asked if anybody was in favour of such a development. Nobody responded. The meeting was then asked if anybody was against such a development and 83 people indicated that they were against it. 5 people abstained.

With such a mandate from the people of Lilydale, it

was decided to establish the Lilydale Protection Group inc. This was introduced to a further meeting in the Village Hall on 22 April.

The purpose of this meeting was to introduce the Protection Group, to recruit members, and to explain the actions in which all those opposed to this development should engage in to lobby the Council. The aim being to persuade the LCC to reject the development application and to work with the community to effect planning and zoning changes for the Lilydale area that would be both sympathetic to community aspirations and assist residents, like the present owner, to dispose of their land more easily and for a higher price. Also the Group will advise FEA that its proposal to establish a plantation in the Lilydale area was against the wishes of a large number of residents of Lilydale and the surrounding area.



## Lilydale RSL

Members of the Lilydale RSL gathered in the very early hours of Friday 25 April to prepare for the ANZAC Day commemorations.

With the dawn still a number of hours away, the busy team were preparing breakfast, preparing the cenotaph, and ensuring all was in readiness for Lilydale's observation of Australia's day of remembrance for those who have sacrificed so much for our way of life.

Under a clear, star lit sky and with dawn approaching people of all ages began arriving.

At this time of day, over 90 years ago men of the ANZAC forces were landing on the beaches of Gallipoli. In later years, the pre-dawn period became a time of waiting. Waiting for the bombardment to stop before the order to "go over the top" of the trenches; waiting for the sun to rise and Action Stations to be stood down; waiting for the attack of the enemy. But today we wait for the opportunity to pay our respects and thanks.

Led by the RSL President, Peter Leonard, and the Rev Brian Cole, approximately 100 people gathered around the pretty, rose planted gardens as first light appeared.

The gathering included a broad cross section of the people of the Lilydale district; small children, some attending their first ANZAC service, their parents, Veterans of World War II, the Korean conflict and Vietnam, Ex-service personnel, and their families, school children and the grandparents who have lived through the years of conflict. The service was addressed by Ms Tanya Rattray-Wagner, MLC, who spoke about her recollections of previous ANZAC Days, including sports

carnivals and other activities. She spoke of sacrifice, primarily of those who died to protect Australia's way of life, but also of those who returned, those who stayed at home and provided support, and those who lost loved ones. The service completed with the Lord's Prayer, the Last Post and an invitation to breakfast. A hearty breakfast was concluded with the raffle being won by Katrina Edwards, a member of the Lilydale District School Student Representative Council.

With the Dawn Service completed, the focus turned to the 11am Service. Another 120 people gathered in the warming weather with members of the Launceston-based 10 Health Company of the Australian Army Reserve providing the ceremonial Catafalque Party. This Unit has been training for many months, displaying the importance they attach to their involvement in our town's ceremony. Again led by the RSL President and Rev Brian Cole the Service, the service featured an address by the 10 Health Company's Padre Captain Sargeant, a recital of the poem "In Flanders Field" by Brittany Williams and Katrina Edwards from the Lilydale District School, and the Ode led by Korean Conflict Veteran Tom Dixon. After the service everybody gathered at the War Memorial Hall for morning tea.

The RSL wishes to thank the many members, Lilydale people and businesses, whose generous donations of their time and produce made the day such a success. They also wish to thank the many people who made generous donations to Legacy during the Service.

### Expansion, Correction and Questions

#### Plantations – Climatic Change – Responsibility for the Future

At the recent public meeting concerning the conversion of agricultural land on the boundary of the village to plantation, I referred to recent Tasmanian research on water availability. I was asked to enlarge. Here is the correct information.

1. A 2006 research and modelling study undertaken by CSIRO/Hydro Tasmania/UTAS/ Tasmanian Institute of Agricultural Research (TIAR) reported

- a. that future climate forecasts indicate by 2040 an 8% reduction in rainfall in the North-East of Tasmania
- b. that evaporation could be expected to increase by 12% over the same period. (A summary of this study as issued by Hydro Tasmania will, I hope, be available at the Post Office and the Public Library at Lilydale District School.)

2. One of Australia's leading climate scientists advised us last year at a Future Tasmania conference in Launceston that such forecasts could translate into a 30% reduction in run-off.

#### **What else do we know?**

Facts (a) Mature tree coverage (especially if there is natural understorey) is beneficial in maintenance of surface and sub-surface water balance, avoidance of erosion, climate stabilisation, provision of carbon sinks, sustaining soil profiles and valuable irreplaceable topsoil, healthy biodiversity and security of ecology. It also provides a useful and sensitive connection between humanity and nature – understood now to be important for human physical, emotional and mental health.

b) Monocultural plantations are very heavy users of water, especially in the early years of growth (i.e. about half the time), promote soil disturbance and erosion, especially by short cycle cultivation, disturb or eradicate biodiversity, unbalance ecosystems, tend to harbour weeds, are liable to cause an affront to the visual and aesthetic quality of a landscape and present significant health hazards.

Thus the government policies and industry practice of the present have significant repercussions for future generations in economic, social, heritage, environmental and health terms.

Opinion: The issue and practice are clearly a matter of inter-generational equity and so one of justice and responsibility. As we are accountable to our descendants, it seems vital to work towards a better operated, accountable, fairly and effectively regulated and monitored forest industry, which can prosper without conflict and destructive tendencies.

I hope this helps explain my concern at conversion of land to more plantations.
