Lilydale Neighbourhood Watch

This was our AGM meeting and was attended by 17 people, which is very pleasing. All the Office Bearers were re-elected to the same positions as last year. A vote of thanks was given to the Committee for their work during the past year and also to the Tas. Fire Service for allowing us to use their premises for our meetings, to Brian for opening up for us and to the people who provide supper each meeting.

Our general meeting was then held. A sub-committee was elected to make arrangements for our 10th Anniversary plans later in the year.

We had a very good Guest Speaker, Troy Walker, from the 'Night Shepherds Security' at our meeting. He spoke on his work with security dogs which covers the whole state. He also brought one of his dogs, 'blade' with him. He had a total of 8 dogs, each trained especially for specific work. He has worked for 12 years with these types of dogs and has been a dog handler in the narcotics role for 4 years. The dogs can cost as much as \$15,000 each. In narcotics, the success rate with these dogs is 98% and 100% for finding narcotics in cars. People can be convicted on the use of a "dogs nose". Troy will train dogs for personal protection. I can't mention all that Troy spoke on but it was a very informative evening.

There was no Police report and no suspicious incidents reported.

The next meeting will be on October 10th at the Fire Station at 8 p.m. Please note change of starting time because Day Light Saving will be on.

The Information Board opposite the Swimming Pool has been vandalised. This, sadly will not encourage tourists to visit our lovely area.

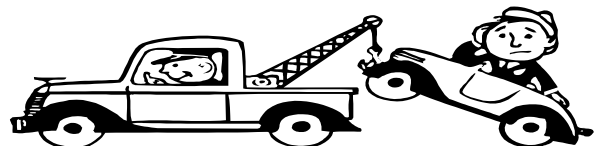

The weather really gave us a workout over the past month or so. If I hear another person say 'nice drop of rain we're having' – lookout! Every time we planned to do something, it rained with all the holes filling with water and the ground becoming soggy.

Despite this, we were able to hold at least one good working bee and to move towards getting all the individual sections of the site clearly defined. Hopefully, by the time you read this, we will have poured the footings for some of the posts for the shelter and installed brick edging around other lawn and garden areas.

Again, another of our local tradesmen has contributed his time and expertise at no cost. Bricklayer Les Arnold devoted two full days towards constructing the two sitting walls between the toilet building and the footpath – Thanks Les! Within the next week or so, the walls should be capped with timber, making them suitable for people to sit on.

Earlier in the month, we received a presentation on the proposed central feature concept from the two artists employed under a special grant by the Lilydale Branch of Tasmanian Regional Arts. The concept, which is based on a typical back yard, was displayed in Bardenhagen's Supermarket window and presentations were made to meetings of some local organisations. Overall, the majority of comments have been very favourable, particularly after people have had an opportunity of having the concept personally explained to them. Apart from keeping up the work on all parts of the site, with the view of hopefully completing the majority of the project by Christmas, our main priority is to finish the toilet block end of the site so that it can be used. With this in mind, we will continue to schedule working bees and look forward to any help which may be offered. Please keep a lookout for details which will be displayed on chalk boards at the site and at the front of the Post Office.

By far the majority of cases of diabetes are Type 2 – insulin is still produced by the pancreas, but for some reason it does not work effectively.

Type 2 diabetes usually occurs in adults over the age of 50, but increasingly it is occurring at a younger age. If you have a close relative with diabetes, you are at greater risk yourself. Lifestyle factors, such as an unhealthy diet and lack of exercise, are known to make Type 2 diabetes more likely. With Type 2 diabetes the symptoms sometimes go unnoticed or might be misdiagnosed. For Type 2 diabetes the symptoms can include any of those for Type 1, but they can also include blurred vision, more frequent skin infections, sores and wounds which are slow to heal, and tingling and numbness in the feet. The good news is that, when detected early, treatment is simple and straightforward. It might just involve regular exercise, some slight changes to eating habits and possibly medicine (tablets or capsules) taken orally. Occasionally, insulin injections may also be needed.

Uncontrolled diabetes poses a serious threat to our health and wellbeing. Complications involve blindness, kidney failure, limb amputation, increased risk of heart disease and stroke, and impotence in men. It is the blood glucose level which needs to be controlled in diabetes. High levels of blood glucose cause all the complications. If your doctor has diagnosed diabetes then you probably have a blood glucose measuring machine. It is important for you to take regular measurements so that you can stay in control of your diabetes. There is a diabetes nurse educator who comes to Lilydale regularly. Ask us at the Pharmacy or see the notice in the window. Diabetics have access to subsidised test strips for blood glucose machines through Diabetes Australia. We are unable to provide these subsidised products directly, as our pharmacy is too small for Diabetes Australia. There about 60 registered diabetics in our area. However, we can supply you with test strips on a prescription, at normal prices (\$3.60 for pensioners or \$22.40 for others). There are regular specials offered for upgrades of your glucose machine and we can get these for you. We can help with information and guidance for any of your diabetes needs.

The newly revised Self Care fact card on diabetes will tell you all you need to know about the different types of diabetes, the signs and symptoms, the effects that might occur and some simple management strategies.

DIABETES

Are you over 50 and overweight – and maybe not quite as physically active as you would like to be? If the answer is yes, then you are a prime candidate to join about one million other Australians with diabetes.

Just last year a national Australian study – *Diabetes, Obesity and Lifestyle* – indicated the alarming fact that a quarter of Australians over the age of 25 have problems with the way their bodies handle glucose.

Maybe we know our blood pressure level, perhaps even our cholesterol level, but do we know our blood glucose level – our BGL? Glucose is our body cells' major source of energy; while insulin is the hormone our body produces to enable the glucose to enter the cells. If we can not produce enough insulin, or the insulin we do produce is not effective, then diabetes is the result.

Diabetes is classified into two main types – Type 1 and Type 2.

Type 1 diabetes usually occurs in childhood or young adulthood, and is one of the most common childhood diseases in developed countries. It is thought to occur when the body's immune system attacks and destroys the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas gland. Because the body stops making insulin, people with this form of diabetes need daily insulin injections. Symptoms of Type 1 diabetes usually occur abruptly and are quite noticeable – they can include excessive thirst and urination, unexplained weight loss, weakness, fatigue and irritability. However Type 1 diabetes represents only about 10-15% of all cases of diabetes.

Vet Talk

"Parvo"

Canine Parvovirus is a viral disease that many people have heard of but often know nothing about. It is one of a group of viral diseases normally included in your dog's vaccination programme.

There are a number of different species-specific parvoviruses (the name means "small virus") including one that causes reproductive problems in pigs and one that causes panleukopenia in cats.

Canine parvovirus was unheard of until the late 1970s and the disease was thought to have developed by mutation of the cat disease panleukopenia (feline enteritis). This cat disease had never affected dogs before.

At that time it was rapidly fatal as no dog had any immunity to it at all and there was an epidemic of it in many areas. Since that time Canine Parvovirus has become much less common as there is a good vaccine and many dogs are now vaccinated.

Parvovirus causes an acute haemorrhagic gastroenteritis that can be fatal in many cases. In young puppies it can cause sudden death from heart failure. The virus also suppresses the immune system. Symptoms include bloody vomiting and diarrhea, depression, dehydration and death. Treatment is symptomatic, as there is no antidote for the virus. Fluid therapy with an intravenous drip, often for several days, is the mainstay of treatment but some animals may still die.

Parvovirus is very infectious and affected dogs have to be isolated. In the right conditions the virus can survive for as long as 12 months in the environment well after the dog has died or recovered. Affected dogs that recover can shed the virus for some weeks after recovery and so are still infectious to other dogs. Many common disinfectants do not kill the virus.

Vaccination is still the best prevention. As pups are the most susceptible temporary vaccinations at around 8 weeks are the time to start and of course it is usually combined with Distemper and Hepatitis vaccine. Talk to your vet about the best course of vaccine to suit your pet and circumstances.

Gardening Tips:

- Z Prune your spring flowering shrubs and trees straight after flowering to direct their growing energy into next season's branches. Shorten over-long canes of abelia, kolkwitzia, may (spiraea), summer lilac or buddleia (pictured above) and weigela by at least a third.
- Z Shear azaleas with hedge clippers into a compact, dome shape.
- Z Prune hibiscus taking last season's growth to 15cm, just above a pair of buds; wait a little longer for exotic, woody Hawaiian hybrids.
- Z Feed shrubs after pruning with complete fertiliser. Camellia japonicas are different: prune in bloom, before new leaf shoots open (this loses some flowers). Compromise by picking lavishly while in bloom, each with a good length of wood, then tidy tree by removing excess branches pointing towards centre, and the usual dead wood and spindly growth. Cut just above a leaf-bud pointing in chosen direction. Try a layered effect, so there is clear separation between branches at different levels.
- Z Camellia sasanquas look good shorn as a hedge, grown as a two-dimensionalespalier on a wall, or clipped into a dome.
- Z Prune spring flowering climbing roses after blooming and tie up new long growth on creepers like wistaria and jasmine.
- Z Control ivy on house walls; it can cause serious, expensive damage to pipes and house structure. Clip to promote new green growth.
- Z Annuals planted now give months of marvellous colour. Plant versatile groundcovers for foliage contrast, in rockeries and bark gardens, for spilling over retaining walls and to choke weeds. Weed control is vital.

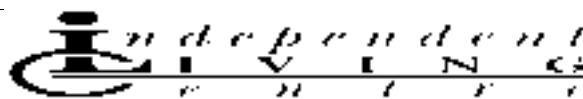

Free Advice on Equipment and Techniques to Help you with Everyday Tasks

Recreation

A current definition of recreation is 'a freely chosen activity that brings about feelings of satisfaction, fulfilment and a sense of belonging to one's local community'.

Everyone has basic feelings, needs and desires to have fun, relax, socialise and participate. This may be a quiet activity such as reading and craft or a more physically engaging activity such as basketball or swimming. It can be a solitary activity, or a group of people interacting and engaging in the same recreational interests. Whatever activity a person finds satisfying or enjoyable is a worthwhile activity in the form of recreation.

Involvement in specific recreational activities is dependent on a person's interests, motivational level, physical and cognitive abilities, as well as the level of support or training provided. Whatever a person's age or disability, it is important to consider opportunities for recreation or leisure.

People with disabilities participate in various levels of recreational activities worldwide. To enable activities to be achievable, safe and accessible for different age groups and disabilities, adapted techniques, equipment and new recreational interests are available.

When choosing an activity consider the following which may impact on the adaptation required, the time of the day the activity is performed or the technique used:

Physical abilities – upper and lower limb range of movement, strength and endurance in sitting or standing.

Cognitive abilities – learning capacity, concentration span, memory recognition.

Sensory function – vision, hearing, tactile, taste, smell.

Communication level – verbal, non-verbal, signing, communication device.

Motivation – What motivates the person to be involved in an activity? What does the person enjoy doing or want to participate in?

Medications – these have different effects on people. i.e. alertness or drowsiness.

Energy Levels – Some people have more energy to participate in the morning or later in the day.

Time allocated – What/How much time is available per day/week to participate?

Support – What level of support is needed to perform activities, from family, friends or carers, with transport, planning, supervision or assistance.
