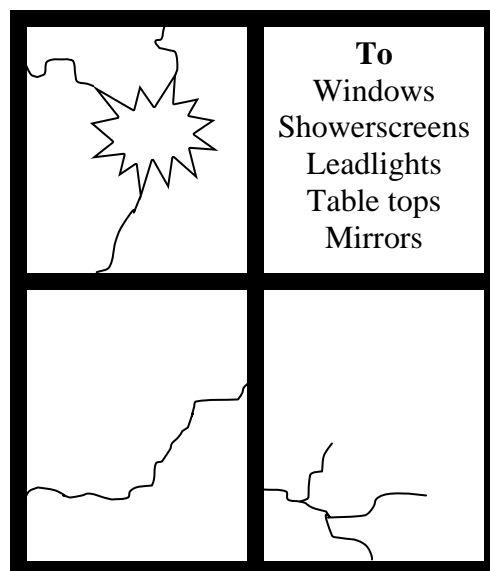

Health Notes

from the Lilydale Pharmacy

Anti-inflammatory Pain medicines

You may be aware of the recent recall of the medicine 'Prexige'. The recall was initiated by the TGA (Therapeutic Goods Administration) after reports of serious liver damage associated with the use of 'Prexige'. The TGA has banned the use of 'Prexige' in Australia. Australia is the first country in the world to ban 'Prexige'.

'Prexige' is similar to the drug 'Vioxx' which was withdrawn from the world a few years ago for causing deaths from heart attacks.

'Prexige' and 'Vioxx' are anti-inflammatories (more specifically, COX-2 inhibitors) and form part of the family of NSAIDs (non steroidal anti inflammatory drugs). This is a huge family, which includes some over-the-counter medicines like Nurofen, Rafen, Panafen, Voltaren and Naprogesic. Many people with arthritis will have used some of the prescription NSAIDs like Celebrex, Brufen, Inza, Oruvail, Naprosyn and Movalis.

All of these medicines are widely used for pain relief, swollen muscles etc., which are associated with sports injuries, bad backs, arthritis and other conditions. As with all useful medicines, there are side effects to be considered. It is then a choice between living with an untreated painful condition or treating the condition and possibly having side effects from the medication. The most important thing is to make an informed choice. You can have a knowledgeable person like your doctor or pharmacist to help you, or you can obtain the information and work through it in your own way.

Recently the National Prescribing Service (a government funded organisation for the Quality Use of Medicines) has recommended that the use of NSAIDs should be minimised. Paracetamol should be the first medicine chosen for pain relief. If 8 paracetamol tablets each day is not enough then codeine should be added to the paracetamol. If this is still not enough, then NSAIDs can be added to the paracetamol and codeine, and used only when needed. It is preferable not to use NSAIDs every day. Try to reserve them for the bad days.

Side effects from NSAIDs include:

- indigestion and stomach bleeds,
- fluid retention and raised blood pressure,
- rash and allergy leading to asthma in aspirin sensitive individuals,
- abnormal liver function and jaundice,
- heart and blood disorders.

Most people don't have side effects, but they occur often enough to be a problem, and some people die. 'Prexige' caused 2 deaths in Australia from liver failure.

Some people find that their pain levels are too high to cope with, without using NSAIDs. They would rather have a better quality of life and risk the side effects. This decision is OK if both the negatives and positives have been considered. Most health decisions are a compromise like this. Doctors and pharmacists are well trained to help you with your health decisions. There is Consumer Medicine Information available for every prescription medicine. CMI's are no longer attached to the medicine. CMI's are updated every month on pharmacy computers. Just ask the pharmacy for a copy anytime.

Nearing Completion - Envirofund 1 - Thanks

Our thanks to the participants in the first of two significant river improvement/water quality projects funded by Envirofund and the landholders.

This first project has involved willow removal, replanting of suitable native vegetation, protection of the river banks and off-stream watering points, and an attack on other declared weeds - gorse, ragwort and of course blackberry.

The Crack Willow which has infested so many of our streams, reducing flow and preventing natural systems from working well, is a Weed of Natural Significance (WONS) and is scheduled for removal and replacement.

Envirofund participants have met from time to time to consider action plans and how to overcome difficulties of unexpected weather - first, excess rainfall and then prolonged drought.

Envirofund is one of the Commonwealth Government's funding opportunities to address local environmental problems. Another group of Lilydale landholders has successfully applied for a grant to continue the work and to enhance the habitat of the local unique crawfish. This is remedial work and designed to ensure good water, healthy rivers and to reduce weed damage into the future for our children and theirs.

Thanks to Theo Ebelaar, Jack Wilson, John Kelly, Katrina McKay, John and Jan Kisiel, Sean Tuckerman, Greg Duke, Graeme and Peter Arnold, for their generous work and investment in Lilydale Landcare's Envirofund I. Thanks to the water monitoring team under the leadership of Libby Wardlaw.

Thanks too to Sharna and Darrell Scholes-Robertson, Brian Kelp, Sean Tuckerman and Les and Eva Borbas for their involvement in, and contribution to, Envirofund 2.

Great work for the benefit of the whole community.

Nearing Completion

Participants in the Envirofund Project on stretches of the McGoverns Creek are nearing the end of the project aimed at weed control (especially willows and gorse), riparian fencing, water quality improvement, off-stream watering, habitat improvement for vulnerable and valuable species.

This has been a very difficult project in view of unusual weather – first of all near commencement, exceptionally long wet and more recently exceptionally long and intense dry. Wet when we wanted access and dry when we wanted to dry fence posts, burn willow piles and plant.

Now Is The Time ! (To Plan)

Over the next few months please plan your attack on weeds – especially:

Ragwort - because as a result of great work in recent years it is in our grasp to have the Lilydale, Lebrina, Underwood and Bangor area largely clear of this dangerous invasive WONS. (Thanks to all who have pulled or sprayed, to Kim Coleman who helped our spray unit on the Ragwort Removal day, TEMCO, which sponsors the Ragwort Raid, Tamar NRM which organises it, and the Fire Brigades around the region who assist.)

Gorse – because it is a declared weed and has a long period of seed "viability" and so – "the sooner the better". It will not go away on its own!

Crack Willows – because they are a declared weed, and significantly damage rivers and water quality, and enlarge the potential for damaging floods.

Blackberries – for lots of reasons we must keep
